On Thursday, June 28th, eight of us (4 Jugend and 4 chaperones) went to St. Louis for the 2018 Jugendlager. As soon as I arrived I got greeted with the awful 95° heat and high humidity, needless to say I was dripping sweat before I made it to the main house. The rest of the youth members from Detroit arrived about 45 minutes after I did and they helped me finish putting up my tent. The first night was a relaxed night, full of introductions, and finding out which group we were in. There was lots of rain, LOTS OF IT, which included the wildest show of lighting I've ever seen.

After that, the dancing began. To anyone who's been to a jugendlager or labor day you know what our parties can become. This, having been my second Jugendlager, I knew what to expect and was not disappointed in the slightest. Polkas and party tunes and some more polkas and then a sing-a-long and then some more party tunes. This time I decided to break out of my shell and partake in every minute of it. This year, I danced more on the first night than I did all of last year's Jugendlager. I had even made myself a friend by this point in the night, a member of the St. Louis Jugendgruppe.

The second morning started off with a shower and some donuts that I had grabbed with a friend. Once everyone had eaten their breakfast and was ready for the day ahead we split into our groups and jumped onto our busses to head to the Gateway Arch. When we arrived at the Arch, our groups split and we got into line. Even though we waited what felt like an hour or so, the wait was well worth it. After the Arch we left for St. Louis' main hall, which is in a different part of town from their outdoor pavilion and where we were staying, for some St. Louis Pizza, Fried Raviolis (which more than one person commented, saying that it reminded them of a Pizza Roll), and Butter Cake Cookies. While everyone finished eating their lunch, we listened to some of the leaders of St. Louis talk about the club.

After their talk, we all got ready to do what seemed like the most anticipated thing of the trip: we went to City Museum. City Museum is best described at a jungle gym for big kids, and little kids, as well as the willing adults who dare to crawl on their hands and knees through narrow passage ways to staircases and tunnels and even up to a 10-story slide or, as us who wore shorts called it, The Mega-Wedgie Machine. When we all pushed ourselves to the point of sweaty collapse, we headed back to the Donau Park for some Pork Steaks and corn on the cob. To start the day we had 90° heat and were sent to go make some Chicken Paprikash for dinner. Then we started the amazing race, and much like the show, we were assigned some interesting challenges, some of which included carrying full buckets of water through an obstacle course while blindfolded, coloring the Donauschwaben Wappen also whilst blindfolded, and attempting to open tiny packets of gummy bears with oven mitts on your hands. After a quick break for lunch we headed into the air conditioned house for a quick craft and a few of us spent the rest of that time watching the world cup match which was on at the time.

After we got pulled from the cool house, we began work on a dance that the St. Louis Jugendgruppe had created, a quick learn and a lot of fun we all enjoyed the process even though we all were all covered in sweat. Once we finished the dance, we were told to go get our swimsuits on as we were going to a pool to cool off, about 13 miles from the club. After I got changed, a friend and I decided to hop into my car and drive to the pool together instead of being crammed next to a bunch of people in the vans. As I left the pool, luckily the first from our group, I bottomed out my car coming down the hill. Thinking I just scraped it and that being the worst of it, I continued onto the expressway. That was when I noticed a small amount of white smoke coming from the back of my car and a faint whiff of oil, I look at my dashboard and notice that my oil light had came on. I then at that point had made my very foolish decision to not stop on the busy expressway and to continue the few miles to my ramp to pull over there. I'm lucky I made it that far, as I start going up the ramp I noticed my power steering had died, and so had my power brakes. I made my way to the traffic light as I heard my engine start to die and I managed to stop at the red light and shut off my car as my coolant light came on and my engine temperature go to the red line next to the "H". Luckily, not too far behind me, was a few cars full of people from our group. They all jumped out to help me move my car out of the way to wait for a tow truck. Two friendly police officers had arrived as we started to push and they also joined in on the game of "push the Intrepid." After getting my car towed to a mechanic, a St. Louis leader, gave Paul and I and another teen who stayed behind to help, a ride back to the club. After eating dinner and dancing for a little bit, I headed into my tent for an early night.

Sunday was pretty much get up and tear down, tents began disappearing right before your eyes. Despite the events of the evening before, I did my best not to let the car incident get me down. I had made plans before I even left for the trip to go hang out with a friend who lives about an hour from the club in St. Louis, and our group was very helpful taking all the things I would not be able to with me to my friend's house. Paul dropped me off with my friend and made his, now, 10 hour journey home.

I am back home and I still made it home as scheduled with the only difference my mother coming to pick me up in St. Louis. I would like to thank the German Cultural Society of St. Louis for hosting this year's Jugendfreundschaftlager, and I would also like to thank the chaperones from Detroit Carpathia who took the time out of their schedules to come watch us crazy teens. Thank you to my two new friends from St. Louis, Sophia and Olivia, and thank you to our Jugendgruppe leader, Paul Schwalbe, who took the time off work to help take us, to allow us to make new friends and memories, and for helping me out when my car had plans of its own. Jugendlager 2018 is one for the books and I look forward to being able to hang out with everyone again at Labor Day in Kitchener very soon.

Jäger Youth Outdoor Day

Remember the days when kids wanted to be outside? Those days are back, because of events like the Carpathia Jäger Youth Outdoor Day. This year's event was a big success because all ages attended, including 8 year olds, middle and high school kids, college students, and even some grandparents!

Each year, the Jäger give families and youth a chance to try pellet shooting, archery and competition-level air rifle shooting. The goal is to give youth an introduction to the sport and an appreciation for the outdoors.

Every station has a Jager explaining the technique. The pellet shooting station included many silhouettes targets and clay pigeon targets – the kids really enjoyed breaking the clays. Everyone also had a chance to shoot archery with both recurve and compound bows.

Perhaps most unusual was the Steyr competition air rifle. The target is placed 10 meters away, and the kids aim at a black circle about the size of a quarter. Inside that circle is a series of rings where the center "bullseye" is about the size of the period at the end of a sentence. This is the same gun and target the Jäger use for their monthly air rifle competition.

The Jäger Youth Outdoor Day is held every year at the Carpathia Club and includes a free BBQ lunch. For upcoming Carpathia Jäger events, visit www.carpathiaclub.com.
